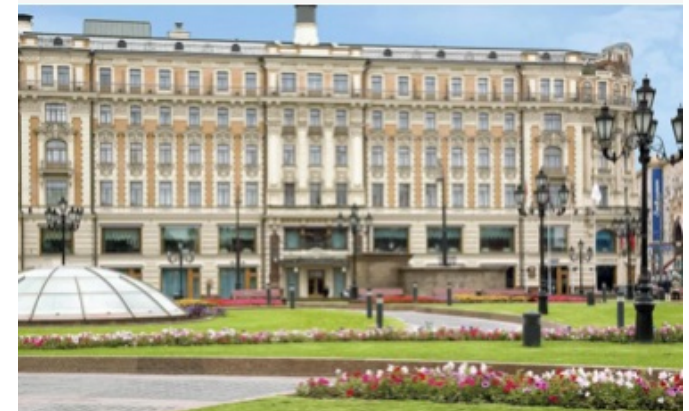

DAY 2

ON THE TRAIN

- City tour including the Kremlin & Armoury, Metro & Red Square & depart.

Today you have a full day tour of Moscow which begins with a visit to Red Square, where you'll see iconic sites like St. Basil's Cathedral and the Lenin Mausoleum. Next, head to the Kremlin for a guided tour of its historic cathedrals, palaces, and the Armoury Museum, showcasing royal treasures, Fabergé eggs, and ceremonial weaponry.

In the afternoon, dive into the architectural beauty of the Moscow Metro, known for its opulent, museum-like stations such as Komsomolskaya and Mayakovskaya. Conclude the day by strolling through Alexander Garden for a visit to the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, offering a fitting end to a day filled with Moscow's historic and cultural grandeur.

Transfer to the station for a early evening departure from Moscow's Kazanskaya station. Settle into your compartment as the suburbs of Moscow are replaced by forest and countryside.

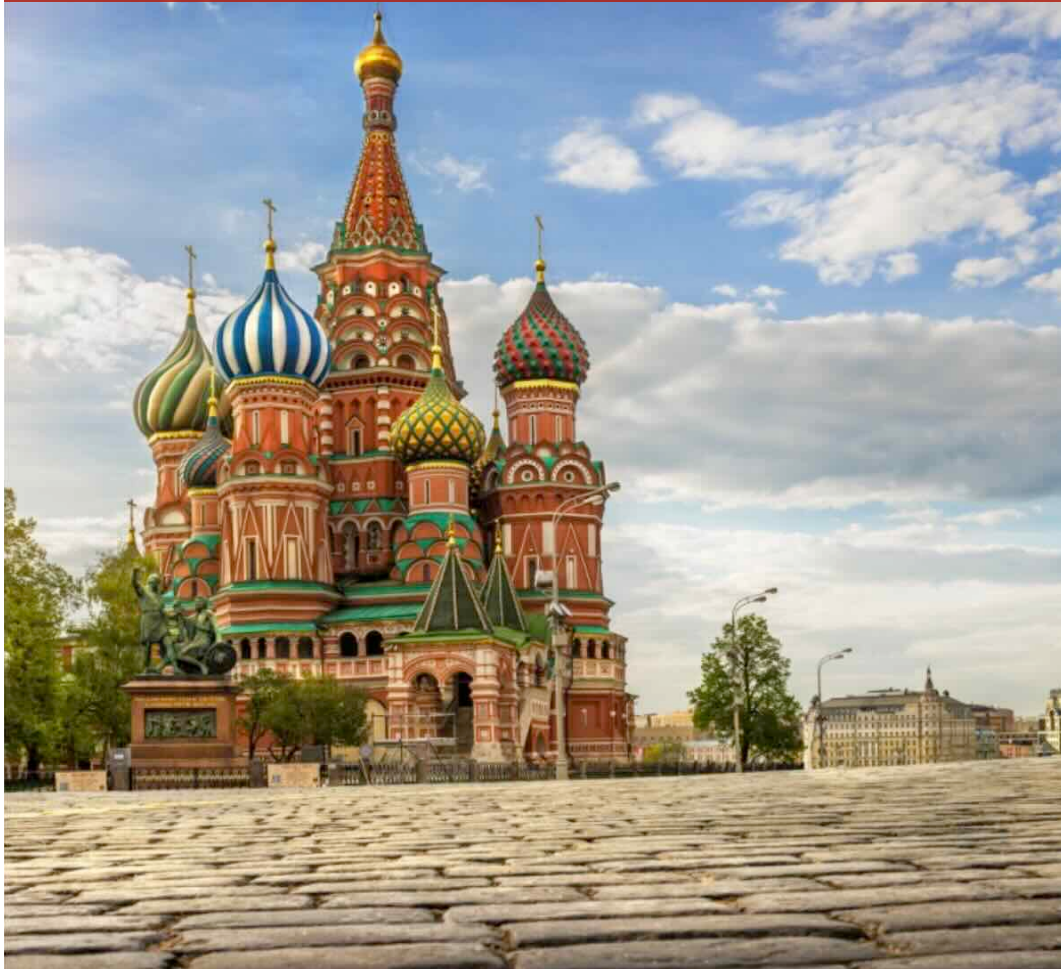

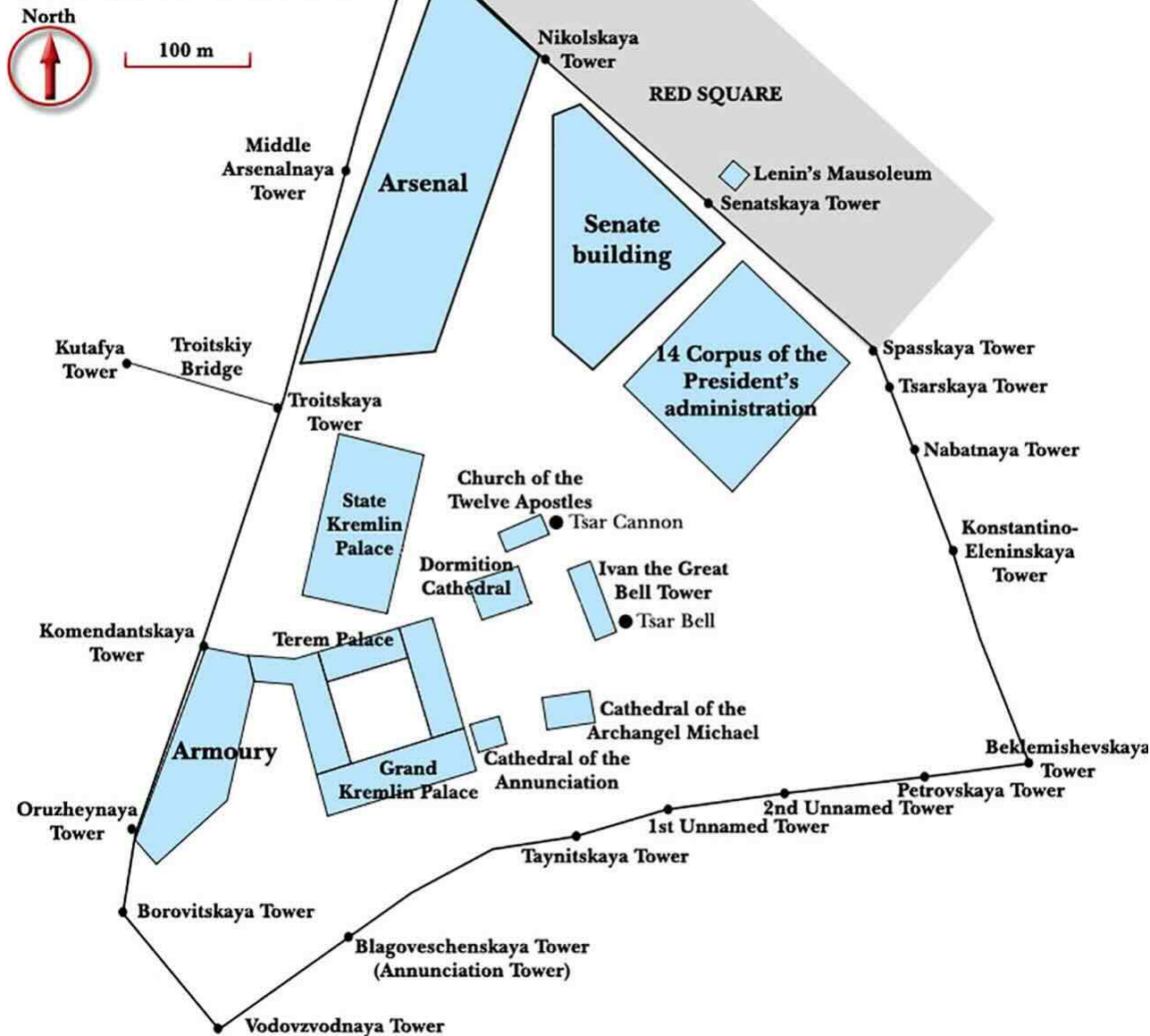

MOSCOW'S KREMLIN - DID YOU KNOW ?

- The Kremlin is the oldest part of Moscow, with origins dating back to 1156, when it was a wooden fortress built by Prince Yuri Dolgorukiy. It has been rebuilt and expanded multiple times throughout its history.
- Covering an area of 27.5 hectares (68 acres), the Moscow Kremlin is the largest medieval fortress still in use today. Its walls stretch for 2.25 kilometres (1.4 miles), and it includes several palaces, cathedrals, and government buildings.
- The Kremlin walls are over 6 meters (20 feet) thick in places and contain 20 towers, each with its unique history. The Spasskaya Tower, added in 1491, is the most famous, featuring a clock and often seen as the main entrance to the Kremlin.
- Although not inside the Kremlin walls, Lenin's Mausoleum on Red Square is closely associated with the Kremlin. It houses the embalmed body of Vladimir Lenin, the leader of the 1917 Russian Revolution.
- There are numerous secret tunnels and rooms beneath the Kremlin. Some of these were built for military defence, while others were intended as escape routes for the tsars and Soviet leaders.
- The Kremlin has served as the political and spiritual heart of Russia for centuries. It was the residence of the tsars, the seat of Soviet power, and today, it houses the official residence of the President of Russia.



YOUR DETAILED DAY BY DAY ITINERARY

DAY 3

EKATERINBURG

- Day on the train before an arrival in Ekaterinburg.

With luck the gentle rhythm of the train led to a good night's sleep! A full day on the train through a region of farms, small towns and villages interspersed with birch forests.

Towards the end of the day you cross the Europe-Asia continental border arriving in Ekaterinburg a short time afterwards.

Ekaterinburg is a more representative experience of a Russian city than, say, Moscow and has a rich and fascinating history including the last days of the Romanovs. It is surrounded by beautiful, rolling countryside dotted with traditional Siberian villages.

Transfer to your hotel to overnight and rest up before tomorrow's tour.

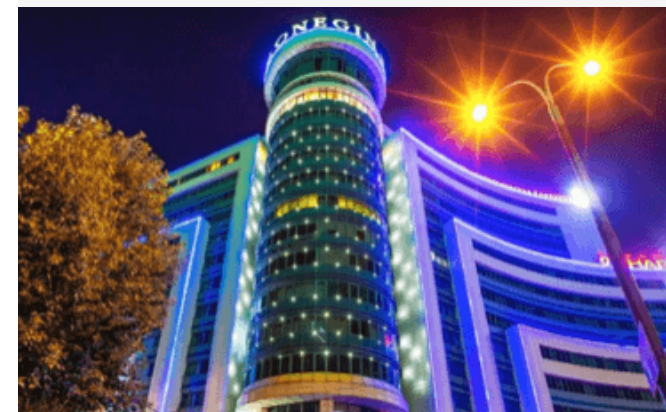

THE ROMANOV IN EKATERINBURG - A TIMELINE

- April 30, 1918: The Romanov family—Tsar Nicholas II, Tsarina Alexandra, and their five children—arrived in Ekaterinburg after being transferred from Tobolsk by the Bolsheviks.
- They were imprisoned in the Ipatiev House, also known as the “House of Special Purpose.” The house was heavily guarded, and the family’s movements were restricted.
- The Romanovs were confined to two rooms. Their personal freedoms and comforts gradually diminished; they were forbidden from interacting with guards and could only go outside for limited walks.
- Heightened Security: In June 1918, the Bolsheviks increased the security around Ipatiev House. Windows were boarded up, and outside communications were cut off, signalling the impending end.
- Bolshevik leaders feared a possible rescue attempt by the advancing White Army, which prompted them to consider the execution of the Romanov family to prevent their liberation.
- July 16, 1918: The Bolsheviks received orders from Moscow to execute the Romanov family, concerned over White Army movements in the region.
- The bodies were initially buried in a shallow grave in the Koptiyaki Forest, near Ekaterinburg. The burial site remained a secret for decades.
- In 1991, the Romanov family’s remains were discovered, identified through DNA testing, and reburied in St. Petersburg in 1998.

The Romanov dynasty ruled Russia for over 300 years, from 1613 to 1917, beginning with Mikhail Romanov and ending with Nicholas II. The family came to power during a time of unrest known as the Time of Troubles, and Mikhail Romanov was elected Tsar in 1613, restoring stability to the country.

Over the centuries, the Romanovs expanded Russia into a vast empire. Under rulers like Peter the Great and Catherine the Great, the empire modernised, engaged with Europe, and grew in power. Peter introduced Western reforms and established St. Petersburg, while Catherine expanded Russia’s territory and promoted culture.

The last Romanov tsar, Nicholas II, ascended the throne in 1894. His reign saw significant challenges, including the Russo-Japanese War (1904-1905), Bloody Sunday (1905), and the Russian Revolution of 1905. Despite efforts at reform, discontent grew. The Bolshevik Revolution in 1917 led to Nicholas abdicating the throne.

In 1918, the Bolsheviks executed Nicholas II, his wife Alexandra, and their five children, ending the Romanov dynasty. The family’s downfall was due to political unrest, social inequality, and failure to adapt to the changing political climate, marking the end of imperial Russia.



YOUR DETAILED DAY BY DAY ITINERARY

DAY 4

EKATERINBURG

- City tour, Romanov's secret graves, Europe Asia border & departure.

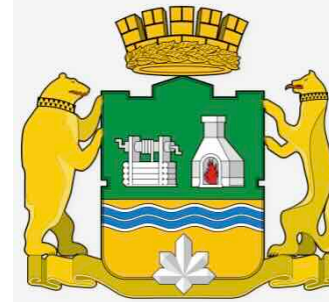
This morning your guide will take you on a 3 hour walking tour of the city's highlights. Stop at the central square and see statues of Ekaterinburg's founders and leaders and learn local stories, legends (and a few jokes!) related to them. Continue to the 1905 Revolution square before the most compelling story will be told at the beautiful Church of Spilled Blood located at the Romanovs' Death Site and Chapel of St Elizabeth. See views from the Hill of Ascension and visit the powerful Afghanistan memorial at the Square of the Red Army.

After lunch (own arrangement) drive 15 km north-west to a monastery dedicated to the Romanov's family located on the spot where the Bolsheviks tried to hide the corpses of the Tsar and his family in a secret grave. Continue on to the continental border of Europe and Asia 20 km west of the city. On the way we make a short stop at the Memorial of Victims of the GULAGs. The Main Obelisk "Between Europe & Asia" allows you to straddle the continental divide and you also get a Certificate with a glass of sparkling wine!

Return to the city with some free time before an evening transfer to the station for your onward train. From this point on you have entered Siberia!

ON THE TRAIN

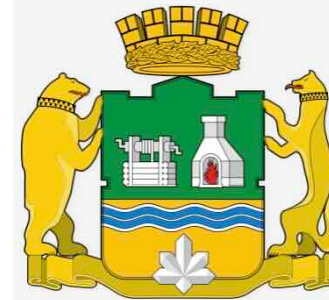
- Your first day in Siberia & the vastness of Central Russia.

The scenery today is flat, often swampy or forested and with few large settlements. The major city is Omsk but there are also a few other large stops. This is a day for relaxing, socialising and getting into a good book!

Did you Know? Siberia covers about 77% of Russia's land area, making it larger than the entire country of Canada. Despite its size, it is sparsely populated. Siberia experiences some of the most extreme temperatures on Earth. The village of Oymyakon holds the record for the coldest inhabited place, with temperatures as low as -67.7°C (-89.9°F).

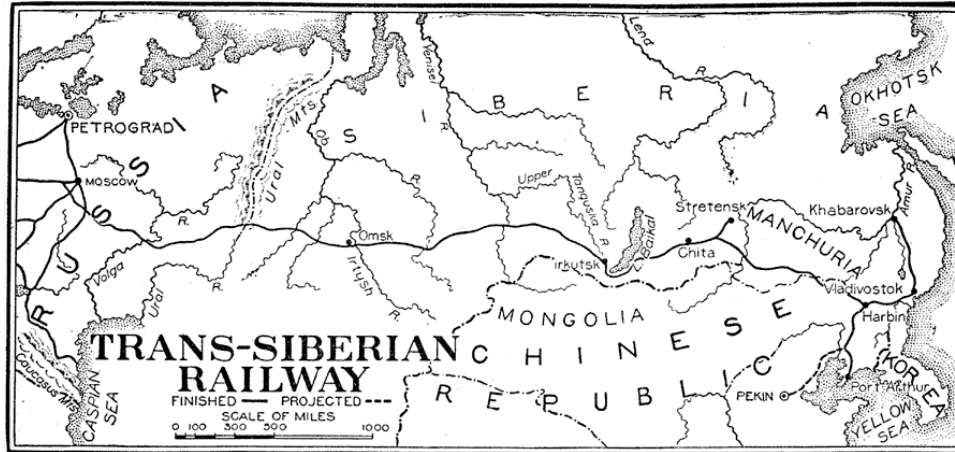

THE BUILDING OF THE TRANS-SIBERIAN



CONSTRUCTION OF THE TRANS-SIBERIAN - DID YOU KNOW ?

- The Trans-Siberian Railway is the longest railway line in the world, stretching over 9,289 kilometres (5,772 miles) from Moscow to Vladivostok. It crosses eight time zones.
- Construction of the railway began in 1891 under the rule of Tsar Alexander III. His son, Nicholas II, who would later become Russia's last tsar, was tasked with overseeing the project.
- The railway was constructed in phases, with work starting in both the west (near Moscow) and the east (near Vladivostok). Different sections were completed at various times, and the entire line was finished in 1916.
- The construction faced numerous geographical challenges, including crossing mountains, forests, rivers, and swamps. For example, engineers had to build bridges across major rivers like the Ob and Amur, and deal with the extreme cold of Siberian winters.
- Before the railway line around Lake Baikal was completed, trains had to be loaded onto ferries to cross the lake. A special icebreaker ferry, the Baikal, was built to operate in winter when the lake froze.
- The Amur Bridge near Khabarovsk, completed in 1916, was the final piece of the Trans-Siberian puzzle, linking the entire route without interruption. It spans 2.6 kilometres (1.6 miles) and was one of the most challenging engineering feats of the project.
- The construction of the Trans-Siberian Railway was extremely expensive and was partly funded by international loans, especially from France. The railway was seen as a crucial strategic asset to expand Russian influence in the Far East.
- The Trans-Siberian Railway has been continually modernised. The electrification of the railway started in 1929 and was completed in 2002, allowing for faster and more efficient trains to operate on the line.

ON THE TRAIN

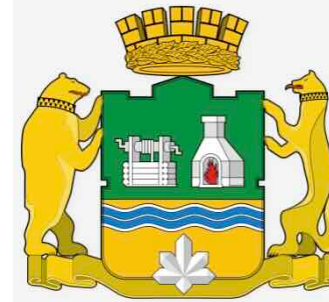
- Continue the journey to Irkutsk with increasingly scenic views.

The last full day on the train in this section of the trip passing prosperous Krasnoyarsk after which the scenery is particularly pleasant consisting of gently rolling hills and dense forests of larch, pine and, of course, birch trees.

There are many rivers and ponds and if it hasn't happened before now you will start to comprehend just how vast and untouched this part of Russia is as the sun sets on the endless taiga of Siberia.

TRANS-SIBERIAN DINING OPTIONS



Introduction: Dining on the Trans-Siberian Railway is a blend of onboard meals, platform food, and self-prepared options.

Dining Car: The dining car offers traditional Russian dishes like borscht, pelmeni, and kotleti, along with simpler fare like salads and sandwiches. Travellers can enjoy hearty, filling meals in a cozy setting while sipping tea, often served in the classic podstakannik (metal holders).

Stations: At station stops, passengers can buy food from local vendors. These vendors sell regional delicacies such as pirozhki (stuffed buns), smoked fish, and fresh fruit, providing a chance to taste the flavours of Russia's vast regions as you pass through.

Supermarkets: Many passengers prefer to bring their own provisions from supermarkets before boarding. Items like instant noodles, bread, cheese, and sausage are popular, with boiling water available on the train to make quick meals. This option is especially convenient for longer stretches between stops.

The combination of onboard dining, platform food, and self-prepared snacks ensures a varied and flexible eating experience, catering to both adventurous and budget-conscious travellers.

TYPICAL RUSSIAN DINING CAR DISHES

- **Solyanka:** A hearty and sour soup with a mix of meat, pickles, and spices.
- **Shchi:** A cabbage-based soup, often served with sour cream.
- **Pirozhki:** Small baked or fried buns filled with meat, potatoes, cabbage, or sweet fillings like jam.
- **Borscht:** A traditional beet soup served hot, often with sour cream and sometimes accompanied by bread or a meat cutlet.
- **Pelmeni:** Russian dumplings filled with meat, usually served with sour cream or butter.
- **Kasha:** A type of porridge made from grains like buckwheat or oats, often served for breakfast.
- **Blini:** Thin Russian pancakes, often served with fillings like jam, sour cream, or caviar.
- **Kotleti:** Meat patties made from minced beef or chicken, typically served with mashed potatoes or rice.
- **Grilled Chicken or Fish:** Simple meat dishes, often served with potatoes or vegetables.
- **Russian Tea and Sweets:** Hot tea served in podstakannik (a metal tea glass holder), typically accompanied by cookies, chocolates, or small cakes.



YOUR DETAILED DAY BY DAY ITINERARY

DAY 7

LAKE BAIKAL

- Arrive in Irkutsk with a transfer down to & tour at the village of Listvyanka.

Arrival in Irkutsk, regarded as the modern day cultural capital of Siberia, famed for its traditional wooden architecture, complimented by a cafe and restaurant culture.

Transfer from the station the 1 hour drive following the route of the Angara River down to the village of Listvyanka located close to where the river meets beautiful Lake Baikal. The lake is among the deepest in the world at 1,642 meters and has exceptionally clear water.

Breakfast and time to settle in to your accommodation before your guide will take you on a 4 hour walking tour including the beautiful church and Limnological Museum to learn about the Lake itself and its unique flora and fauna. We also take chairlift up to a view point for some of the best lake vistas. If time we can also visit the local fish market before a free evening.

NOTE: Hotel check-in time is 12 noon so we can't guarantee a room will be available when you arrive, particularly in the busy summer season.

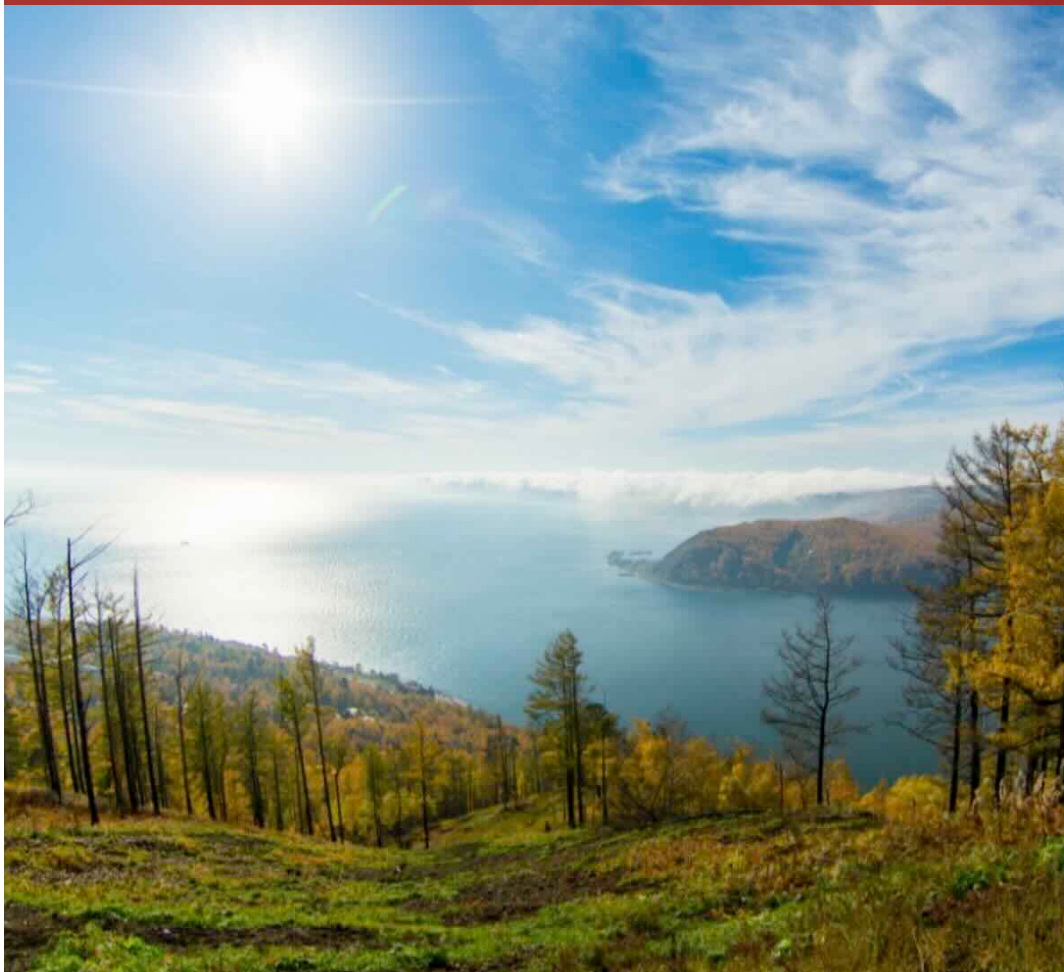

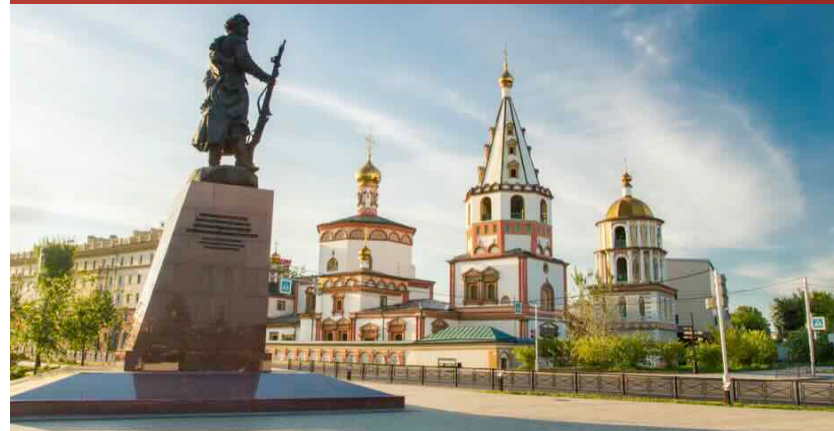

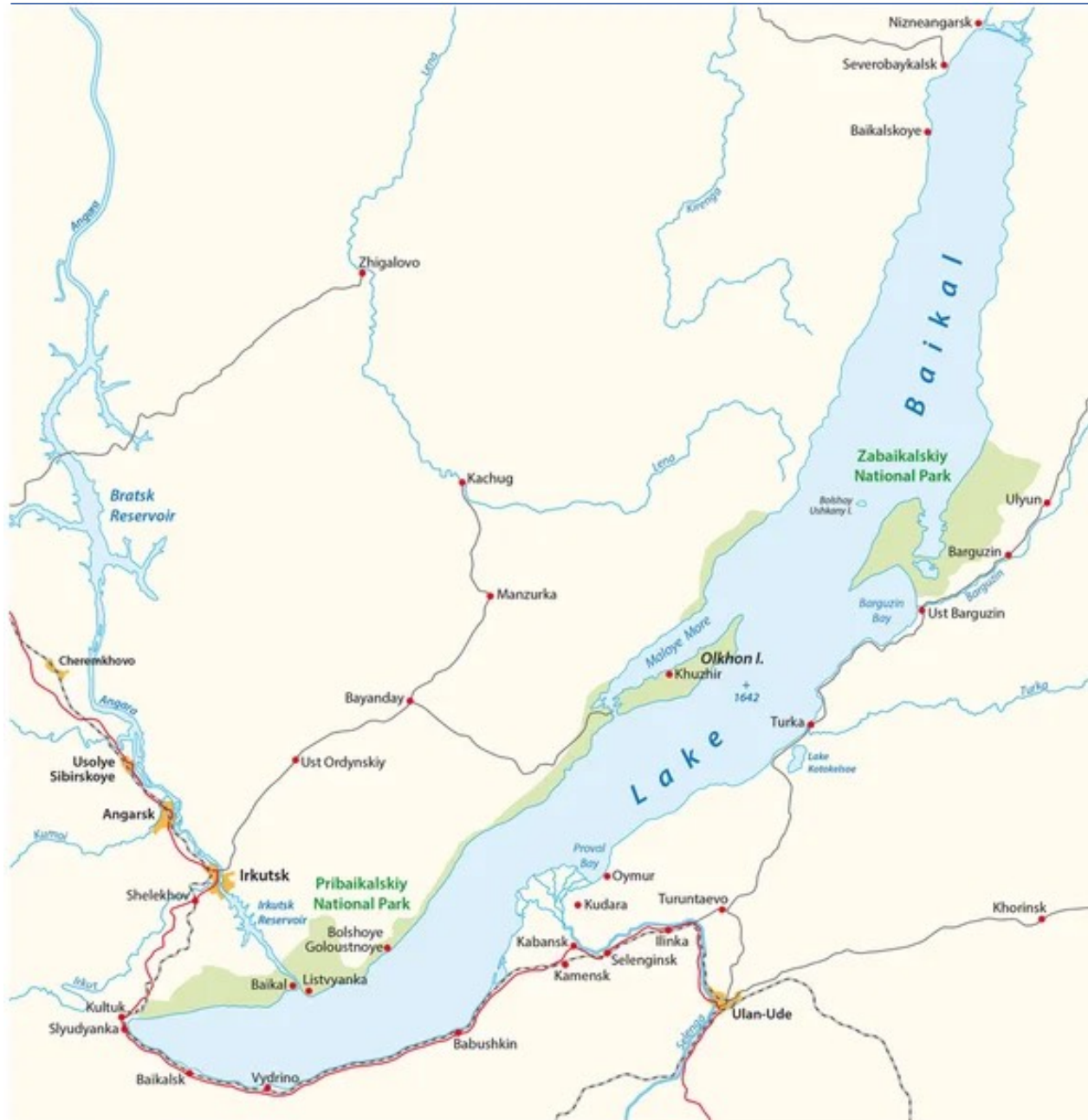

LAKE BAIKAL - DID YOU KNOW ?

- Lake Baikal is the world's oldest freshwater lake, estimated to be around 25-30 million years old. Its age makes it a unique natural laboratory for studying evolution and geological processes.
- With a depth of 1,642 meters (5,387 feet), Lake Baikal is the deepest lake in the world, holding about 20% of the world's unfrozen freshwater supply.
- The lake hosts over 3,700 species of plants and animals, two-thirds of which are endemic, meaning they can't be found anywhere else. The most famous is the Baikal seal (nerpa), the only freshwater seal species in the world.
- The water in Lake Baikal is incredibly clear, especially during winter. In some areas, you can see up to 40 meters (131 feet) down into the lake.
- Lake Baikal is a rift lake, formed due to tectonic plate movements. It's still expanding, at a rate of about 2 cm (0.8 inches) per year, meaning it could eventually become an ocean over millions of years.
- During the winter, the lake freezes over, and its ice can reach up to 1.5 meters thick. The ice is so transparent that people can see fish and plant life beneath it.
- For centuries, Lake Baikal has been considered sacred by indigenous people, especially the Buryat population.



YOUR DETAILED DAY BY DAY ITINERARY

DAY 8

IRKUTSK

- Drive back to Irkutsk for a city tour and free time.

After breakfast, embark on a scenic drive, approximately one hour, back to Irkutsk, where you'll head to your hotel for a short rest and check-in. Once you've settled in, you'll begin a leisurely two-hour walking tour of the city centre, exploring Irkutsk's rich history and architecture. Your tour will take you through the central park, where you can visit the War Memorial, a solemn tribute to fallen soldiers. Along the Angara River, admire several of the city's beautiful churches, showcasing Irkutsk's architectural diversity and spiritual heritage.

As you stroll through the main city streets, you'll experience the vibrant atmosphere of Irkutsk, with its blend of modern life and historic charm. A highlight of the tour is a stop at the statue of Alexander III, the Russian tsar credited with the construction of the Trans-Siberian Railway, which played a key role in connecting Siberia with the rest of Russia. The guide will share interesting insights into the significance of this monument and the impact of the railway on the region.

After the walking tour, return to your hotel, where you'll have the rest of the day free to relax or explore at your own pace. You can visit local cafés, discover nearby museums, or enjoy a peaceful evening walk along the riverside to soak in more of Irkutsk's unique atmosphere.

- Journey along the shore of Baikal through Buryatia & cross into Mongolia.

Early morning transfer to the station to catch your onward train. Today is usually the scenic highlight of the journey - a day of lake, forest and mountain views. After Irkutsk the train rumbles around the Southern shore of the stunning Lake Baikal often passing within a matter of meters of the lake and providing endlessly changing vistas. You will also notice a change in the people with many more Asian faces as you enter Buryatia which has strong cultural ties to Mongolia. This is a remote and pretty section of the trip with a hint of an old Asian culture ever present. Eventually you arrive at the Russia-Mongolia border at Naushki passing through the border formalities before continuing into the grasslands of Mongolia.

NOTE: The border crossing is slow and the your carriage will be detached from the Russian engine and join a Mongolian train. Whilst the train is stationary the toilets are locked! However, you can get off once the border formalities are complete and visit the facilities in the station building.

There is usually no dining car from the Mongolian border to Ulaanbaatar as the distance is short and through the night so make sure you have some provisions with you for any midnight munchies!

MONGOLIA

- Arrive in UB, Genghis Khan Statue, Kazakh family, Terelj National Park.

En route, you'll also stop in Nalaikh to meet a Kazakh family, where you'll learn about their unique lifestyle. Their traditional Kazakh Gers are known for vibrant, decorative interiors featuring colourful wall-hangings.

Upon reaching Terelj National Park, you'll check into your ger camp, enjoy a local lunch, and visit a traditional Ovoo, a sacred stone cairn used for spiritual offerings. The remainder of the day is yours to relax and appreciate the stunning surroundings before dinner and overnighting in your cozy ger accommodation.

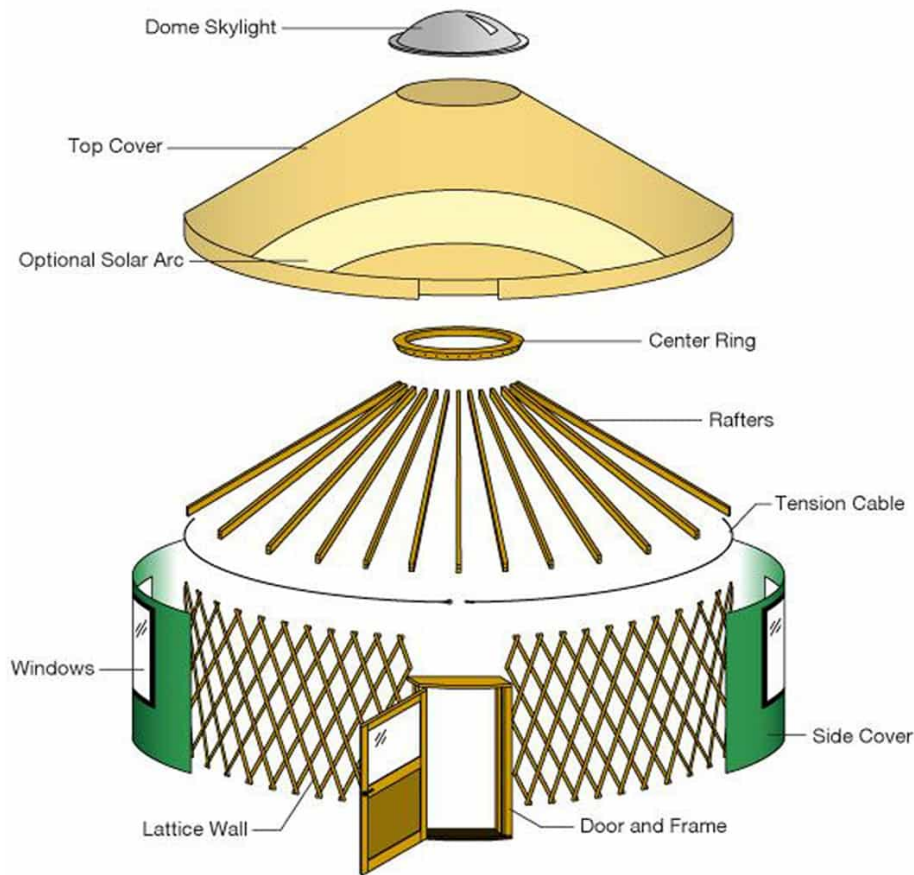
LEARN ABOUT GER CAMPS

Bugat resort is a tourist camp located within the Gorkhi-Terelj national park, 80km to the east from the capital Ulaanbaatar.

Mongolian gers, also known as yurts, are traditional round, portable dwellings used by nomadic herders in Mongolia for centuries. Made from a wooden lattice framework covered with felt and canvas, gers are designed to withstand Mongolia's extreme weather, from hot summers to freezing winters. They are easy to assemble and transport, making them ideal for a nomadic lifestyle. The interior typically includes a stove in the centre, with the layout reflecting Mongolian customs and family life. Today, gers are also a symbol of Mongolian heritage.

MONGOLIAN GERS - DID YOU KNOW ?

- The design of the ger (yurt) dates back over 3,000 years, making it one of the oldest continuously used types of dwellings in human history.
- A ger can be disassembled and reassembled within an hour, making it ideal for the nomadic lifestyle of Mongolian herders.
- Gers are built to withstand Mongolia's extreme climate, from hot summers to harsh winters with temperatures dropping to -40°C (-40°F). Layers of felt insulate the structure during winter and can be removed in summer.
- The ger's structure is made of a wooden frame and covered with felt made from sheep's wool, reflecting Mongolia's resource-efficient and environmentally friendly approach.
- The circular design allows for even distribution of wind and snow, making it more stable in Mongolia's vast and windy steppes.
- The stove, or hearth, is placed in the centre of the ger, symbolising warmth and family unity. It also serves as a central cooking and heating source.
- Tradition dictates that the door of the ger always faces south, providing protection from cold northern winds and ensuring sunlight during the day.
- The interior of the ger is organized according to Mongolian customs. The right side is traditionally for men and tools, while the left side is for women and household items. The north side is reserved for the altar and important family possessions.
- The ger is central to Mongolian hospitality. Visitors are always offered a seat on the left side, facing the family's most honoured possessions.
- Although rooted in tradition, modern gers can include solar panels, satellite dishes, and modern amenities, blending ancient customs with contemporary comforts.

DAY 11

MONGOLIA

- Return to Ulaanbaatar for a city tour and folk show.

After breakfast return to Ulaanbaatar for a city tour starting with a visit to Zaisan Memorial Hill located on the south side of the City beside the Bogd Khan Mountain. Here there are the best views over the city.

After lunch near to Zaisan, continue to visit “Gandan” Monastery, which is Mongolia’s largest functioning Buddhist monastery including the Mongolian Buddhist University. The highlight of visiting to Gandan is 26 meter-high majestic gilded indoor statue of Megjid Janraisig.

Next we visit Sukhbaatar square which lies at the heart of the city surrounded by important buildings such as the government palace, banks and theatres and the central post office. There is a statue of national hero Sukhbaatar and a massive bronze statue of Genghis Khan and four warriors in front of Parliament House.

Finish the tour at your hotel and check-in with free time before finishing your time in Mongolia with a folk show showcasing traditional performances by singers, dancers and contortionists. It’s a unique chance to hear Khöömii (throat singing) and see the various national dresses of Mongolia. Return to the hotel to overnight.

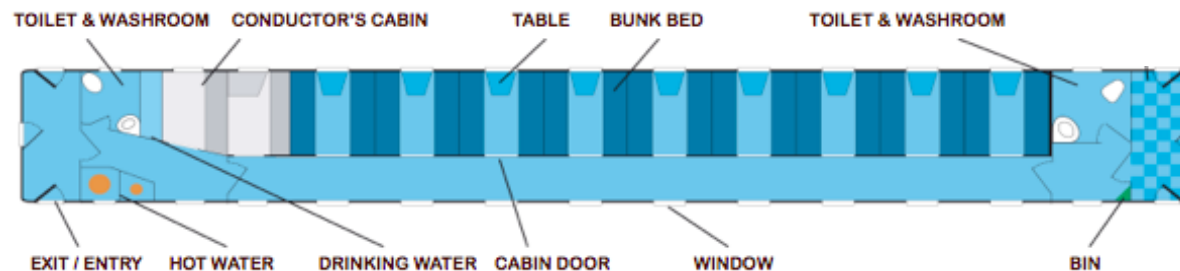
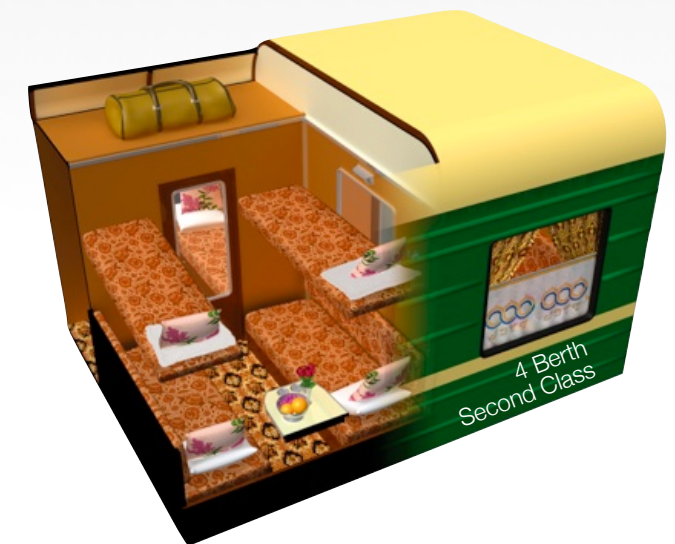
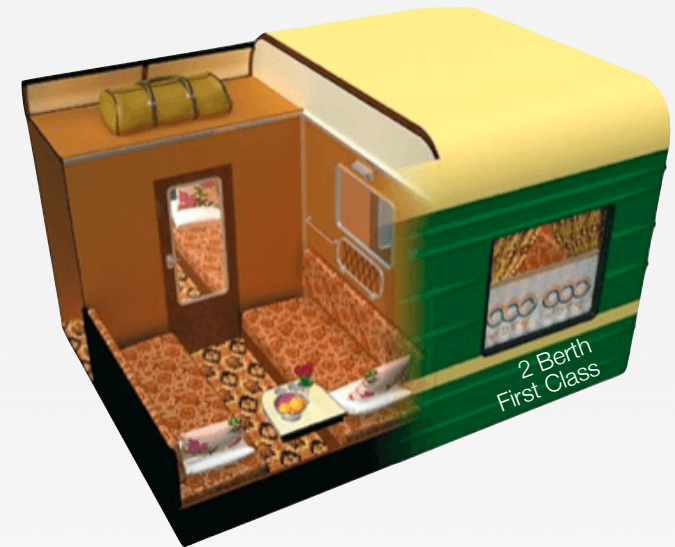

VACCINATIONS

Vaccinations are generally not required for entry into Russia, but it is recommended to be up-to-date on routine vaccines like MMR (measles, mumps, rubella), diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis, and influenza. Additional vaccines to consider based on your activities and areas of travel include Hepatitis A (for food and water safety), Hepatitis B, Rabies (especially for rural areas), and Tick-borne Encephalitis if you plan to hike or camp in forested regions during the spring or summer.

VISAS

Citizens from the United States, Canada, the UK, and EU, typically need a tourist visa to visit Russia. The visa application process requires an invitation letter (also known as a visa support document), a completed visa application form, a valid passport (with at least six months remaining after the visa expires), a passport-sized photo, and proof of travel insurance. Processing can take from a few days to several weeks, depending on the country and service chosen. This [Wikipedia link](#) is useful.

WHEN TO VISIT

The best time to travel the Trans-Siberian Railway is late spring (May) or early autumn (September), when temperatures are mild, and landscapes are at their most scenic, with blooming flowers or vibrant fall colours. These months avoid the extreme cold of winter and the summer tourist season. June to August is also pleasant but busier, while winter (December to February) offers a magical snow-covered journey, though temperatures can drop below -20°C.

ELECTRICITY & PLUGS

Russia uses 220V, 50Hz electricity. Plugs are Type C (European) and Type F, both with two round pins. These are standard in most European countries.

MONEY TO TAKE

When visiting Russia, it's useful to carry Russian rubles (RUB) for smaller purchases, especially in rural areas. Major cities like Moscow and Saint Petersburg widely accept credit and debit cards. ATMs are readily available for cash withdrawals, and Visa and MasterCard are the most commonly accepted cards. It's advisable to exchange some currency before arrival or use ATMs for rubles. Inform your bank about your trip to avoid card issues abroad.

VACCINATIONS

Vaccinations are not required for entry into Mongolia, but it's recommended to be up-to-date on routine vaccines like MMR, diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis, and influenza. Vaccines for Hepatitis A and Typhoid are advised due to potential food and water risks. Hepatitis B is recommended for extended stays, while Rabies and Tick-borne Encephalitis are recommended for rural travel. Consult your healthcare provider for personalised advice based on your itinerary and health needs before visiting Mongolia.

VISAS

Mongolia allows citizens of 62 countries, including the U.S., Canada, and EU nations, to visit visa-free for 14 to 90 days depending on nationality. Travellers from other countries must obtain a 30-day tourist visa, which can be extended in Mongolia. Visas are available at Mongolian embassies and consulates. Check specific requirements before traveling, as policies vary based on nationality and travel purpose. This [Wikipedia link](#) is useful.

WHEN TO VISIT

The best time to visit Mongolia is from June to September, with warm weather ideal for exploring the Gobi Desert, trekking, and camping. July is popular for the Naadam Festival, showcasing Mongolian culture. Temperatures range from 20°C to 25°C (68°F to 77°F). For cooler weather and fewer crowds, late August to early September is ideal, as the landscapes remain lush and travel conditions are optimal for outdoor activities.

ELECTRICITY & PLUGS

Mongolia uses 230V, 50Hz electricity, with Type C and Type E plugs, which are common in Europe. Ensure your devices are compatible.

MONEY TO TAKE

It's advisable to carry some Mongolian Tugriks (MNT), especially for use in rural areas where cash is preferred. In larger cities like Ulaanbaatar, credit and debit cards are widely accepted in hotels, restaurants, and shops. ATMs are available in urban areas for withdrawing local currency. It's recommended to exchange money at banks or official exchange counters, as foreign currencies are not typically accepted. Always carry some cash in remote regions.



ESSENTIAL TRANS-SIBERIAN INFORMATION, TIPS & FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS



HOW FAR IN ADVANCE DO I NEED TO BOOK?

The Trans-Siberian can be quite a complex trip with a definite peak season when tickets and good hotel rooms can become scarce so we recommend booking as far in advance as possible if you are travelling from June to the end of September. Outside of this period we still recommend booking at least 2 months in advance to allow plenty of time to obtain the visas.

CAN YOU OBTAIN THE VISAS FOR US?

We have a partnership with the visa agents [CIBT Visa Central](#) who will guide you through the visa application process. As you are likely to be obtaining more than one visa for a Trans-Siberian trip it makes sense to make use of a specialised visa agent who will do the leg work running between the various embassies.

WHAT IS THE BEST TIME OF YEAR TO TRAVEL?

The summer months from June to the end of August are generally considered the best and are certainly the busiest. However, catching the Autumn colours from early September is probably our favourite time to visit Russia although Mongolia can already be cold. China tends to be best in September and October although do try and avoid the week long National Day holiday during the 1st week of October. Don't forget that Siberia looks stunning in winter!

DO YOU HAVE FINANCIAL PROTECTION?

IS IT WORTH TRAVELLING IN WINTER?

Oh Yes! Siberia looks amazing, a ger stay in Mongolia is the definition of cosy and Beijing is cold but dry and sunny. All three countries are very used to dealing with winter making the experience more comfortable than you might think.

DO THE TRAINS HAVE PLUGS FOR RECHARGING?

As a rule, yes although if there are 4 of you in a cabin you will need to take turns - or bring an extension plug! You can also ask your provodnitsas nicely if you can use her plugs but that will depend on the individual and they may expect a tip for this.

IS TRANS-SIBERIAN TRAVEL SAFE?

Yes! In recent years we hear of very few problems either on the stops or the trains and there is no reason why you should not feel as safe if not safer than if travelling in your home country. This applies to men or women traveling alone and exercising reasonable common sense.



ESSENTIAL TRANS-SIBERIAN INFORMATION, TIPS & FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN FIRST & SECOND CLASS?

First and second class cabins are the same size and tend to have similar facilities with the only real but big difference being that 2nd class cabins have 4 berths and first class 2 berths. So a couple get privacy and space in first class. A first class carriage will also have less competition for bathroom although this is not usually a big issue or a particular reason to go first class. Second class is arguably more social.

WHAT HAPPENS ONCE WE MAKE A BOOKING?

On taking a booking we will confirm as many of the services as can be at that point and then ask you for a non-refundable deposit of 20% per person plus any international flights we are booking with the final balance payment due 60 days before your trip start date with us. On booking we will also offer advice about obtaining the visas and about 1 month before your trip with us starts we will send you our exclusive Trip Guidebook tailored to your specific trip with us.

CAN YOU BOOK INTERNATIONAL FLIGHTS ?

Yes, as we hold an ATOL license (number 10287) we are permitted by the Civil Aviation Authority in the UK to book flights on behalf of our clients. We are a British Airways preferred operator but also book with other airlines to get the best deals and routes for our clients.

WILL MY PHONE WORK ?

Yes and you will find coverage is surprisingly could all the way along the train routes and in cities. If you buy a SIM card make sure you are buying for the right phone system as some mobile companies in Mongolia, for example, operate on GSM (same as UK, Europe) and others CDMA (North America and Japan). You should also check what roaming charges will be with your mobile provider.

We took our first Trans-Siberian trip in 1997 and between us have taken many trips since. HOW MUCH MONEY WILL I NEED TO TAKE WITH ME?

The bulk of your costs are taken care of when booking with us so you will only be spending on day to day expenses such as additional meals, drinks, souvenirs and any entrance fees on free days. Russia is expensive and it is easy to go through £50 a day in Moscow although less elsewhere. Mongolia is likely to be cheapest as there isn't that much to spend money on in the countryside. China is between the two with spending from about £30 a day upwards as an approximate guide. On the train it would be difficult to spend more than £20 a day.
